Back to Montepuez!

Praise God! Thirteen Months after being asked to leave we have finally been granted permission to return and work among the Makua- Metto people in Montepuez.

For those of you who have followed us in this long and arduous journey and prayed with us over the past year, today is a day of thanksgiving.

After being asked to leave by the government on June 18, 2004 we have spent our time five hours south in the city of Nampula working with local churches and learning the Makua language. We have spent many days wondering why we were asked to leave and whether Montepuez was the place we should minister. The ups and downs of life hit us full force as we repeatedly visited government officials to resolve our paperwork and get permission to work in Montepuez again.

To say, however, that this past year was wasted or that our work was pushed back would be erroneous. Quite to the contrary, we have learned so much and have been blessed with enormous opportunities that we would not have otherwise had if we were still in Montepuez.

First of all, we had good reasons and opportunities to meet and get to know the highest government officials in our province. Secondly, we have been blessed immensely by the Makua language course that we are currently finishing up. Also, the Muahivire church has been a wonderful encouragement to us, as well as a place for us to cut our teeth in cross cultural ministry. All of these are opportunities we have been granted because of being asked to leave.

Maybe more importantly was the fact that we had a chance (though it was forced on us) to step back from previous plans and reflect on what we were doing, much like the apostle Paul going to Arabia or even Moses fleeing from Egypt to the desert to return later as a great leader. It was definitely a time of intense prayer and personal reflection about who we are in God.

In the next few weeks our plans are to move back to Montepuez and settle into our home that has been uninhabited for the last year. We look forward to seeing how our ministry unfolds. Thanks again to all who have supported us during these ups and downs. We are thrilled at the opportunities that lie before us in Montepuez. Now the hard work begins!
